Coffee houses or common gatherings where coffee is also served dates back to the year 1555, in the High, God-Guarded city of Constantinople, as well as in Ottoman lands. “People engage in conversation, for it is there that news is communicated and where those interested in politics criticize the government in all freedom and without being fearful, since the government does not heed what the people say. In addition, mollas, dervishes, and poets take turns telling stories in verse or in prose. It often happens that two or three people talk at the same time, one on one side, the other on the opposite, and sometimes one will be a preacher and the other a storyteller” says 17th century French traveller and writer Jean Chardin. From 1670 to 1685, Coffee-houses in London began to multiply, and to gain political importance due to their popularity as places of debate. 18th century onwards coffeehouses functioned as early reading centers and the emergence of circulation and subscription libraries which provided greater print access for the public. The coffeehouses were a social magnet where different strata of society came together to discuss topics of the newspapers and pamphlets. In India, the impact can be well traced back to the independence movement. The coffee house is a well-rehearsed set up to provide a platform to practice for perfection. Here in a specially

designed ambience with visual illusions for attracting Attention, assuring Interest that leads to a Desire for Action. Each of the attendee, visitor offers a talk / opines on anything that is of concern.
